There is a beauty in the strength and determination of a woman who follows her own path, who isn't thrown off by obstacles along the way.


There is beauty about a woman whose confidence comes from experience; who knows she can fall, pick herself back up, and move on.

Resurrection Sunday

MARKING THE END OF THE LENTEN SEASON

The word "Easter" does not appear in the Bible. Easter, like Christmas, is a tradition that developed later in the church history. It's unfortunate that many of the most solemn and preeminent celebration of Jesus Christ Resurrection customs are mixed with pagan associations and secular commercialization. For these reasons, many Christian churches choose to refer to the Easter Sunday holiday simply as **Resurrection Day.**

ESURRECTION SUNDAY is the principal festival of the Christian church which celebrates the Resurrection of Jesus Christ after His crucifixion. It is a movable date that can fall between March 22 and April 25. It's always celebrated on the Sunday after the first day of spring immediately following the full moon. This year Ash Wednesday-February 17 marked the start of Lent which is a 40-day period of fasting, repentance, and spiritual discipline. The virtual service at Rising Mount Zion was a blessed evening of prayer, the Spoken Word, Salvation, giving, and the resourcefulness of the Imposition of Ashes during which Pastor challenged the virtual worshippers to embrace their positive and righteous practices and relinquish their negative and unrighteous behaviors. The week preceding Resurrection Day is called *Holy Week/Passion Week* that began with *Palm Sunday*-March 28. Our spiritual leader ministered about Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem, riding a donkey that symbolizes humanity and a beast of burden. The crowd spread the way with Palm leaves and shouted "Hosanna" as He possessed into Jerusalem, and in days, the same group was yelling "Crucify Him." Maundy Thursday-April 1 in the commemoration of The Last Supper when Jesus shared the Passover meal with His disciples on the night before His crucifixion, commemorated on Good Friday-April 2. Pastor Cooper again participated in a virtual and limited in-person worship service wherein seven pastors preached mini sermons referencing Jesus' "Seven Last Words." Our Pastor spoke on the fifth Word, "I Thirst." His powerful brief message awakened our thought process because in most instants human "thirst" references to drink water to clinch the natural dehydration of the body. Pastor poignantly reminded us that if Jesus thirst only for water, He could have spoken and rain would have streamed down to satisfy His dryness. On the other hand, His thirst was to fulfill His mission on the Cross—His willingness to pay the ultimate price for salvation and forgiveness of our sins. As Christians, we should thirst to study/obey His Word, keep His Commandments, and seek to please our Savior in all ways. In closing, Pastor stated, "The body cannot survive without water, nor can the believer survive without Christ.'

Resurrection Sunday-April 4 marked the ending of the Lenten season. After more than a year not being able to worship in-person in our sanctuary, Pastor Cooper was emboldened to remind the virtual audience of the similarities of the historical Crucifixion and the celebration of the present-day Crucifixion. Historically when Jesus died, the hope of people was wounded; their faith was fractured; and their expectations were extinguished because they expected the Messiah to come down off the Cross. Instead he stayed, suffered and expired, causing frustration, fear, and dashing hope and expectations. BUT, when Jesus rose they had a resurrection experience that the "Death" and the darkness could not defeat their experiences. Likewise, in the midst of COVID, we, too, have scattered, vacating our sanctuaries, social gatherings and personal contact with family and friends. We must remember that God is not out of experiences; and our hope, faith and expectations are never to be extinguished! GOOD NEWS---though He died on Friday, He rose early Sunday morning with all power in His hands! Therefore, we must wait on God, be patient and expect a miraculous experience. It's time to celebrate "Because He Lives"! The Resurrection Sunday Sermon Title & Scripture was "I Told You So"... Matthew 28:1-6



A Year of Virtual Learning in Public Schools







For the past year, at least, public school virtual learning on the elementary, middle, and high school levels has been bitter sweet. Since March 2020, administrators, teachers, students and families have been affected in various ways. Immediate adjustments had to be made because of the abrupt national closing of all public educational systems; and in many cases the public school systems were not technologically prepared for online teaching, counseling, and study.

A number of families and public school systems were ill-prepared due to the following reasons and more:

- Working parents, mostly mothers lost and/or took-a-leave of absence from their jobs if there wasn't a relative, neighbor or a facility available to care for young underage school children.
- Some parents were first-responders or worked from home. Whatever the situation, adjustments had to be made.
- Many families didn't have access to technology that prevented them from being able to connect to the internet in order to use laptops and other online media devices.
- Families had to be creative in making available space and an adequate environment for children to study. Sometimes, the kitchen table had to be used. In other situations, a room had to be converted for use, especially if there were more than one school aged child in the home.
- If a family had poor connection to the internet, sometimes the parent/student has to sit outside or go to the library, etc.
- In some case, the parent had to monitor the child during study time to make sure student was in right class at the right time, to be familiar with the work so that he/she could give help to the child after hours, and to make sure child is participating, staying on task, and completing assignments.
- Parents had to also be involved in child's education, plan and implement wholesome activities and down-time from studying, and to offer healthy connections to family and friends so that the child didn't become depressed in thought or action.
- Students had to be alert, properly dressed, sign-in on time, participate, and contribute to the well-being of the class.
- School systems were obligated to provide laptops/chrome-books for each student who had not been issued one prior to the shut-down, and make sure the online connection to the teacher was available.
- The system was also responsible for necessary training and giving proper guidance to teachers, referencing teaching methods, approaches, and environments.
- Teachers had to plan well, making lessons interesting, challenging students who have different capabilities to successfully meet requirements, to be available to answer questions, and to offer additional help when necessary.

No doubt, the success of a student is determined by his individual attitude, the physical ambiance of his home environment, access to proper learning tools, the patience and attitude of everyone involved in the learning process. School board members, administrators, teachers and parents are deeply concerned about education gaps created by the year under COVID-19 and the future success of students once schools reopen for in-person learning. Virtual learning had its advantages and disadvantages while some students welcomed it, and others didn't. Everyone wants to return to some type of normalcy where they can again enjoy every phase of life!

She was also there for the birth of my daughter and spent the first two weeks helping us settle in as a new family of three. She continued to be a central, loving part of our family until her death.

I cannot imagine what my life would have been like without either of these two women: my Mother and my Aunt Burnette. I thank God for having both of these women in my life.

When my mother was the oldest child but not yet a teenager, her mother passed, leaving the responsibility of helping her father rear her four younger siblings, as well as working on the farm where her father was a sharecropper. The challenging adjustment was instrumental in keeping the family together as a loving close-knit family, and helped her develop unmatched household skills, good and dependable work ethics, determination, and a willingness to help others.

Being my mother's older daughter of three other siblings, I love, adore, and respect my mother whom I continue to regard as my "champion!" She was a woman of faith, God-fearing, loving, kind-hearted, hardworking, confident, patient, and not easily angered. I never heard her speak ill of anyone but was always easy-



going, thoughtful, and caring toward her family and others. Her faith and trust in God were etched in her character, and she chose not to seek revenge or entertain negative comments; but rather relied on God to uphold His promises and fight her battles. My siblings and I always knew that our mother loved us dearly, showed tough-love, and punished us when we deserved it. We were taught to love God and one another, to work hard, take care of and appreciate everything we got, be kind to others, never look down on or belittle anyone, save money no matter how small the amount, respect self and others.

At age 19, my mother married my father whose family owned a farm. As my siblings and I grew older, there was always plenty of work to be done and definitely no room for complaining. Daily, we thanked God for our blessings because we had plenty to eat, clothes on our backs, though homemade, shoes on our feet, and shelter over our heads. Tobacco, cotton, cucumbers, large vegetable gardens, sweet and white potatoes, cantaloupes, red and yellow meat watermelons, wheat, hay, corn, chickens, pigs, and cows/bulls were grown and raised for financial needs, food, shortening, flour, milk, care for farm animals, and to share with others. Additionally, strawberries, blackberries, and plums were planted and/or grew natural to the region; and apples, pears and peaches were picked and/or gathered from our orchards that my mother canned and made preserves, jellies, pickles, and desserts. Her specialties were fried chicken, barbecue, chocolate pies, coconut/pineapple cakes, homemade biscuits, lemonade, and homemade ice cream. My siblings and I ate ham and/or sausage biscuits long before McDonald's or any fast food restaurant sold them. In spite of the tasks, my siblings and I rarely missed a day from school. We had chores before and after school, and had to work on Saturdays and all summer. On Sundays, we spent much of the day in a church where my mother was active and made sure we were involved in school and church activities. She was our best cheerleader!

Although my mother did not graduate from high school she was smart, a talented and disciplined hard worker and a resilient advocate for education and would not tolerate anything less than our best. With diligence and purpose she emphasized to us the importance of setting goals, preparing and working for whatever we wanted to achieve in life, and offering excuses were unacceptable! My siblings and I graduated from high school, college and/or the military.



My grandmother, Blanche (Big Ma) often gave this advice to her children, grandchildren and anyone else whom she felt needed guidance and encouragement. She was also a caregiver to many throughout her life. Although, Big Ma lost two of her children at a young age, she never lost her faith in God.

My mother, Annie, a beautiful loving woman of faith who loved her fancy hats, suffered a long illness after I was born. Yet, God enabled Big Ma to travel to Philadelphia to take care of us. She then brought my brothers and me back to the Eastern Shore to live with her. My brothers later returned to Philadelphia and I remained with my grandmother, returning to Philadelphia mostly during the summers.



Big Ma's house was where family and friends gathered for the holidays. Everyone loved her homemade rolls, deviled eggs and made from scratch cakes and pies and delicious homemade ice cream. Living on a peninsula between the Chesapeake Bay and the Atlantic Ocean, seafood was plentiful, and part of our diet. Big Ma loved to travel; most importantly, she loved God and lived her life in that spirit. She often read the Bible to us and she made certain we participated in Sunday school, church choir, and other church programs. She was a devout Christian and member

of the St. Paul African Methodist Episcopal Church where she served as a trustee and missionary. She loved dressing in her Sunday best with a fancy hat and gloves to visit other churches for programs and conferences. She had an old pedal sewing machine and told us how she made baseball uniforms for our grandfather's baseball team. My grandmother occasionally worked with my uncle as custodian at two of the county's elementary schools, as well as other establishments. She raised her own pigs and chickens, farmed her own vegetables, grew several fruit trees, canned her own fruits and vegetables, and shared abundantly with others. Big Ma was a loving and caring person, and people from all different backgrounds throughout the community loved and respected her. She had numerous favorite "sayings" and often taught us poems and told us stories about our family heritage that included Native American Indians. I can remember her singing her favorite hymn - "Precious Lord, take my hand, lead me on, let me stand."

Other arms reach out to me. Other Eyes smile tenderly. Still in peaceful dreams I see. The Road leads back to you...

While these words immortalized by Hoagy Carmichael in 1930 in the song, "Georgia on My Mind" became the state song of Georgia, they make me think of the Georgia in my life and that of my siblings. I think of my blessed mother

who was born Georgia Esther McLaughlin in rural Southside Virginia on December 22, 1908. She proudly added Luck to her name in 1924 when she was united in marriage with my father, Charlie S. Luck. This union was blessed with fourteen children, two of whom died in infancy and twelve others who went on to thrive in adulthood.

Both of my parents were deeply rooted in their abiding faith in our Heavenly Father and His infinite grace and mercy. My mother's faith, therefore, guided every aspect of the way she mothered us. Despite the challenges she must have faced living on the farm and rearing twelve children, she was selfless; she was loving, and her sacrifices were too numerous to mention here. While our Mom worked in the fields beside my father who was a sharecropper, she never failed to keep the home fires burning. She made clothes for us to wear, knitted guilts to keep us warm, sent us off to school with brown-bag lunches and did her best to nurture us back to health when we were sick. Everything she did was an expression of love. While her labor was intensive and the hours long, she managed to reserve enough energy to make us feel safe and protected. She taught us to always put God first and strive to do our best in every task we undertook.

Someone told one of my sisters it was hard to believe she had eleven siblings because she acted like an only child. My sister responded that she felt exactly that way. In her time and space with my mother she was the most important thing in my mother's world. She had her time and space with Mama and she always felt special. As she grew up and discussed this feeling with the rest of us, she discovered that we all felt the same way. Mama in her selflessness and unconditional love made each one of us in our moment with her feel special. I have revisited these childhood memories because they are foundational to all we have become.

My mother is with the Lord now, but for me, my siblings and many others who called her Mother, Mama, Grandma, and Big Ma she will forever be "Georgia on Our Minds".

Even though he knew God and loved God he wavered in life just like so many of us did and still do. After years of battling with his demons, he finally gave in to allowing God to help him. He made a vow to God that if He delivered him from his addiction that he would serve and praise Him for the remainder of his days. That was over twenty-six years ago, and he has kept his word.

God blessed him with an amazing voice that allows him to minister through song. When he ministers he is truly on one accord with the Holy Spirit and ministers in ways that bless and inspire so many lives. In the past ten years, Walter's health issues with his back have caused him much pain and resulted in multiple surgeries. His signature song, "Broken but Healed", is his testimony in knowing that God has him. Kind, caring words can build-up, whereas mean, harsh words can tear down and destroy. KINDNESS, as it is used in the Bible, means to be kind-hearted in words, actions and deeds. It is the good –nature of love. The kindness of love strives for fairness toward God and the humanity of mankind. Our language, actions and deeds of kindness must be evident to all people irrespective to their color, creed or physical make-up. Words are our most powerful tool that provides a bold affirmation of our innermost thoughts and influences, and they build relationships. Choose to speak and show the love of God every day and remember that without words, a thought can never become a reality. As Christians, we should always be mindful of the "muscle and impact" of words as the following suggestions indicates:

- Think carefully before you speak. Someone who reacts to something someone said or did can cause damage so profound that it severs a relationship. Too often persons who "fly off the handle" and never stop to think about the repercussions of their words often cause hurt and even irreparable damage.
- **Keep your cool in stressful situations.** Once a word is spoken, it can never be recaptured no matter how much you apologize.
- Take a step back. An emotional reaction or angry tirade hardly ever solves a dilemma but losing your temper may cause an embarrassing situation.
- **Don't take it personally.** Practice patience and understanding and always treat everyone with the same level of respect you'd like to be shown.
- Walk away. If a situation pushes you to your breaking point, step away until you can return with a clear mind and have calmed down.
- Speak from the heart. Practice self-awareness over the words you use.
- Ask, "How is this going to serve me or my happiness?" When you complain or use "hateful" words out of fear it can only make you feel worse, manifesting these fears into your life with greater intensity.
- Choose your words bravely, consciously, and lovingly. Speak from a place of love for yourself, your life, and for others.

InnovAge is one of more than one hundred PACE providers across the U.S.

Health Matters

FINGER NUMBNESS

It is tingling and numbness in your hand or fingers. Usually, you can get the pain and numbness in the thumb, index and middle finger. The pain and numbness come on with overuse of the hand and gripping things. It is called carpel tunnel syndrome.

Symptoms of carpal tunnel syndrome usually start slowly. Many people first notice the signs overnight because they sleep with their wrist bent. The hand feels numb and wakes you up and many times person will have to shake their hand to help get the feeling back. This occurs because one of the main nerves in the forearm and wrist called the median nerve is squeezed or compressed. The space as the nerve goes thru the wrist area is a small space and the nerve becomes trapped in this very tight space causing the symptoms of pain, tingling and numbness.

Many factors can cause this area to become too tight for the nerve. Repetitive work of certain jobs such as working on a computer, holding the steering wheel with long distance driving, and the overuse with working with machinery are examples of activities that can irritate this area and cause swelling that compresses the nerve. Other causes include fluid retention during pregnancy or menopause can also cause this syndrome. Persons who have rheumatoid arthritis, diabetes and hypothyroid are more likely to develop carpel tunnel syndrome


Initial treatment starts with splinting the wrist of the involved hand. This limits the movement and keeps the wrist in a neutral position and helps to reduce the pressure on



the nerve. Sometimes splints are only worn at night. It is also recommended to take breaks from the tasks that put stress on your

hands. Over the counter pain relievers can help reduce the discomfort. Steroid injections are sometime given in the wrist to help reduce the inflammation in the nerve to help reduce

symptoms. Surgery is necessary when the conservative treatment has failed, and the numbness and pain become persistent in the hand and



tingling and pain in the hand and fingers, be sure to check in with your doctor to get the correct diagnosis. Prevention of carpel tunnel syndrome includes minimizing repetitive hand movement, avoiding to hold an object for too long in the same position, taking frequent breaks from activities using the hands and stretching the hands prior to doing any strenuous and repetitive work with the hands.
