Ash Wednesday begins The Season of ···



Resurrection Sunday, is a penitential season observed by Christians. During this season, Christians behold a period of fasting, prayer, submission, repentance, moderation and spiritual discipline that examines our faith and deepens our commitment to live the Christian Life. The principle purpose of the Lenten season is to set aside time for reflection on Jesus Christ – His suffering and sacrifices, His life, death, burial and resurrection! While Ash Wednesday is a movable date and varies from year to year, it is always in the

month of February or March, depending on where Resurrection Sunday, the most sacred and spiritually powerful in the Christian calendar, falls in the Christian liturgical year.

This year in spite of the wind chill and cold weather on February 10, Ash Wednesday, a great crowd assembled in the Zion old sanctuary for the worship service, joyfully greeting one another and anticipating a teachable and meaningful sermon. Many were eager to see, hug, and welcome Pastor Cooper home from an exciting and rewarding 8-day trip to Israel! Thus, the ambiance of the sanctuary was extremely jovial, reverent and worshipful. Worship leader, Deacon Mary Kemp called the worshipers to order, signaling everyone to stand to sing, "Blessed Assurance", to participate in the Call to Worship, and the Invocation offered by Rev. Doris Batts. Led by Trustee Phil Downey and accompanied by the Worship on Wednesday "come as you are" singers and our skilled musician, Jahi Watson, followed with two spirit-filled uplifting gospels, *Oh Magnify the Lord* and *This Is The Day The Lord Has Made*.

As Pastor Cooper promptly stood, gleefully greeted the congregation, he asked everyone to briefly greet one another. Honoring his word and keeping the service on task, Pastor offered a transitory prayer into his message for the evening. Utilizing several appropriate scriptural texts, Joel 2:1,2 & 12-17, Psalm 51:10, Daniel 3:9 and others, Pastor captured the attention of the diverse age group audience who clang to every word of the powerful and understandable message. The crowd responded boisterously as Pastor delivered a most meaningful sermon and emphasized several poignant points: (1) Pray with a purpose. (2) Focus on and prepare for the coming of our Savior, Jesus Christ. (3) Live a God-centered life with your priorities straight. (4) Ask God to create in you a clean heart. (5) Point fingers at self instead of others. (6) Take the opportunity to see yourself as God sees you. (7) Evaluate self and know the areas in which you need to improve. (8) Serve our Lord and His people. (9) Be Christ-like in your way, walk, witness, word and worship. (10) Be humble in character, be obedient and about what God has called you to do. (11) Know that God blesses you to be a blessing to someone else. (12) Walk the walk you talk. Pastor Cooper closed by asking us to examine self, submit to the Will of God, repent, and allow God to use us, remembering always to give Him the glory! Rejoice in His greatness and let others see Christ in our daily living!

Following the mighty Word of God, the worshipers participated in giving with the offertory prayer offered by Deacon Lorenzo Doswell, and were invited for the *Imposition of Ashes*. Each congregant received the ashes in the sign of the cross upon his forehead with the Ash Wednesday reminder, "You are dust; and to dust you shall return." Pastor Cooper offered a fervent, blessed prayer and invited all to leave the sanctuary in quiet reflection.

The church family responded overwhelmingly, giving bountifully to support the cause that helped the designated women as well as some men in need. Since this project was concluded near the Christmas season, it was decided to disperse the donations of items as Christmas gifts as a way to let the recipients know that though they may be "shut-in", they are not "shut-out" from compassion, prayers and love. The residents of the City of Richmond jail received the largest donation—144 pairs of undergarments, 195 bags of toiletries, reams of shampoo and conditioner, and Bibles. In addition, the Henrico County Jail Chaplin Services received 100 Bibles. Unfortunately, mouth wash and toothbrushes were items that could not be accepted at the jails because the inmates abuse such items to get drunk and/or transform them into weapons. Thus these realing surplus items were given to Healing Place, a homeless shelter and rehabilitative center for men. This facility houses, feeds, shelters, provides clothes and offers GED classes and substance abuse treatment to men who are down-in-their-luck and/or are in need of rehabilitation for substance abuse. Once they are in the program, they must remain for at least a year. All gift bags and Bibles were labeled with the church's information and Pastor's name as an outreach and evangelistic endeavor to promote awareness of the church family of Christ ministries. This project was both inspiring and informative to many. Again the members of the RMZ Women's Ministry sincerely thank our Pastor, members and friends for your generous support for this project and offer unto God our highest praise! Hallelujah! Glory to God!

- Be a resident in Virginia. A person who has come to Virginia for temporary purposes and intends to return to another state is not considered a resident for voting purposes
- Be a United States citizen.
- Be 18 years old. Any person who is 17 years old and will be eighteen years of age at the next general election shall be permitted to register in advance and also vote in any intervening primary or special election.
- Not be registered and plan to vote in another state.
- Not currently declared incompetent by a court of law.
- If convicted of a felony, your right to vote must have been restored.

REGISTRATION FORMS can be obtained at any of the following locations: local Voter Registration office, online, local and state government offices, armed forces recruitment offices, public libraries, State Board of Elections office, Department of Motor vehicles offices, and Voter Registration Drives.



# BOOK REVIEW

# If You Want to Walk On Water, You've Got to Get Out of the Boat

The author begins with the example of Matthew 14:25-32 walking on water and asks us to do likewise and to step out on faith and experience more of the powers and presence of God. Water walking is the picture of doing with God's help what we could never do on our own. Through scripture, there are patterns where God uses ordinary people to engage them in acts of extraordinary trust—to use and improve them. He will ask us to do things that are scary for us that may exemplify an inadequacy in us, a fear of failure. But He promises to be with us always. "I will help you to speak and teach you what to say" he told a stuttering Moses.

God is calling us to walk with Him and to Him. The author is inviting us to do just that: to go for a walk on water. But first, we must get out of the boat. We all have a boat—whatever it happens to be—and if we choose to get out of it, we will still have problems. There will be risks; the possibility of failure. But even if we fail, Jesus will be there to pick us up. We will not be alone.

The Master affords us all gifts: talents, our minds, our abilities, our spiritual gifts, our bodies, our money, our will and Himself—the greatest gift of all. How we use our specific gifts and talents says so much about our willingness to get out of the boat (or not) in so many instances. We often allow our comfort or fears to be an excuse for not exercising a gift. We may fear that we have little to offer; little potential, but God can take what we have and make a big difference for all eternity. We should reveal our gifts; give all we can, for we serve the Lord of the Gift!

Water walking means to have first discerned the call—having the wisdom to do so; then walking the walk (on water). There is a difference between faith and foolishness, devotion and lack of impulse controlled risk taking. There are people who are drawn to high risk behaviors. They are easily bored and prefer novelty and consistent variety and stimulation. Therefore, it is important to determine the difference in an authentic call from the Master from one's own rash impulse reaction. We all have a calling. We are all a piece of work, made in God's image. We are called to use our endowed giftedness to serve the world to honor God. To fulfill the mission, we must discover our calling through careful listening, assessing our gifts, talents, passions and even our limitations. Our calling may prove to be painful and will likely require us to work for and with God. It is not a career, necessarily, which is what we do for pay and upward mobility. Through our calling, God wants to do great things of lasting value with us by His power and grace if we are willing to let our feet get wet.

So we must face our fears and storms and not just passively resign. We must remain committed to our values even when tempted to compromise. Try to find meaning and purpose in the storms as they have a way of teaching what nothing else can. Fear is the number one reason people won't get out of the boat (comfort zone). Fear disrupts faith and can be the biggest obstacle to trusting God completely. It obstructs the potential that God has placed in each of us. Fear suggests that God is not really big enough to take care of us and our troubles; that we are not safe in His hands.

Remember "trying and failing, learning from failure and trying and trying again works a lot better than waiting for perfection." Hope is the fuel to get us out of the boat. Trust will hold us up. Fear will sink us. We must continually focus on our Savior with hope, trust and confidence. We must not look down. If we do, we will be lost.

Jesus gives us the power to walk on water when He calls us to do so. Although we may sometimes fail, He never sets us up to and it is never His intent. Never-the-less, we must keep our minds focused on Him before, during and after the storms of life and if we want to walk on water, we must be willing to take a chance and GET OUT OF THE BOAT!



during the 20<sup>th</sup> century and discussed how one girl's bravery in the face of adversity could have lasting impacts in our community. The children were also given booklets about African American inventors.

On the third Sunday, the preschool's breakout session recited parts of Martin Luther King's "I Have a Dream" legendary speech. They also created artistic black and white hands clasped together to illustrate Dr. King's Christian beliefs. The older groups finished viewing and discussing the movie, "Ruby Bridges." Many of the children were unaware of the numerous African-Americans who have contributed greatly to Virginia's heritage and culture. The teachers provided booklets about influential African-Americans from Virginia to all participants as well as discussed several. As quoted by the Civil Rights activist Marcus Garvey, "A people without the knowledge of their past history, origin, and culture is like a tree without roots."



## **Know The Risk Factors For Osteoporosis**

Osteoporosis usually occurs most often in post-menopausal women. This condition makes bones weaker and thinner putting you at risk for fracture. Post-menopausal osteoporosis can lead to fracture of the spine, hip and other bones sometime even without injury. In the 5 to 10 years after menopause, up to 20% of bone mass is lost. Over the age of 50 every 1 in 2 women will have a fracture related to osteoporosis. This condition is more common in women than in men. The stronger your bones are at a younger age, the lower the risk for having osteoporosis later on as you get older. The preteen and teen years are a key time for bone building. Know your risk factor for developing osteoporosis:

- Age over 65
- Previous history of suffering a broken bone
- One of your parents had a hip fracture
- Low bone density score on the dexa scan that screens for osteoporosis
- Thin frame body
- Physically inactive
- Frequent falls
- Not getting in enough vitamin D or calcium
- Smoker
- Having more than 2 alcoholic drinks per day
- Taking medications such as steroids which cause bone loss



Bones need calcium, vitamin D and exercise to stay strong. Talk to your doctor about the right amount of the vitamin D and calcium that you need for your particular age. Other sources of Vitamin D include eggs, fatty fish, cereals and fortified milk. Foods rich in calcium include dairy products and dark green vegetables. Weight bearing exercises are also good for building bone. Weight bearing exercises include in addition to weight lifting, walking, jogging and stair climbing and dancing.

For the elderly fall prevention is important in helping to prevent a major fracture. Take a survey within the home and be sure that throw rugs and other objects are not on the floor that could cause a fall. Wear supportive shoes with low heels and nonslip soles. If needed use a cane or

walker to help with balance. Keep stairs, porches and walkways well lit. Use night light in the hallways and bathroom also at night to make visual where you are walking. Lastly, avoid going out when it snows or is icy outside and avoid wet or slippery surfaces which increase your fall risk. And remember that women need to regularly have the bone density scan to access their bone health and the need for medication which can help with thinning bone. Medications for osteoporosis help to increase the bone density and thereby strengthen the bones to resist fracture.
